

Roundup Elections

Candidates for the State 4-H Council will be elected during your regional meetings on Monday evening. Each region will select two senior representatives (must be entering senior year in high school) and two junior representatives (must be entering junior year in high school). The senior representatives will be the candidates for State Council president and vice president.

To be eligible to run for an office, you must have been approved for membership in the Tennessee 4-H Honor Club prior to Roundup. Two representatives-at-large will be selected through an interview process during the week. Candidates for these positions will be selected at regional meetings.

All Star Exhibits

Each active All Star member is eligible to enter a project exhibit in the All Star exhibit competition. Exhibits must be set up between 1:30-4:30 p.m. on Monday. Exhibits may be taken down Thursday afternoon.

Purpose

The purpose of the project exhibit is to provide 4-H All Stars an additional opportunity to share ideas accomplishments, requirements and/or results of special studies or research in their 4-H project.

Rules

1. Any active 4-H All Star who attends the State 4-H All Star Conference may enter one exhibit in the competition.
2. Exhibits must be displayed on a 3' x 3' tabletop. The area from the table top to the floor may also be utilized.
3. Members are encouraged to make their exhibits "free standing," since it may not be possible for each table to be against the wall.
4. Exhibits will be scored according to the 4-H Educational Display score sheet.

Awards

A first place plaque will be awarded to the All Star with the highest scoring exhibit. The top five exhibitors will receive a \$25 award. All exhibits will be classified into blue and red award groups.

Are you interested in learning new things? Do you like to have fun, dance, make friends? Then 4-H Roundup is the place for you! Since 1924, Tennessee 4-H'ers have gathered annually on a campus of the University of Tennessee for 4-H Roundup. The event serves to recognize 4-H members for their outstanding project work and leadership accomplishments.

State All Star Conference is a part of the Roundup program. All Stars conduct service-learning projects and recognize outstanding service projects.

Who May Attend

All project finalists should plan to attend. The current state winners in citizenship and leadership, all active 4-H All Stars and current 4-H members who have previously attended National 4-H Congress as project winners may attend Roundup.

Each county may send one active volunteer leader per eight (or major fraction thereof) members attending Roundup.

State 4-H Council, volunteer leaders and selected UT Extension personnel also attend to assist with the program.

Cost

The Roundup registration fee is \$75 for state finalists and \$225 for All Stars attending as non-finalists. State Council members and volunteer leaders attend on scholarship. Registration should be completed through each regional office.

Housing and Meals

All delegates will stay by regions in the air-conditioned comfort of Fred Brown Hall at The University of Tennessee, Knoxville. Most of the meals will be in a university cafeteria. Breakfast will be provided.

Gentlemen: A shirt and tie is appropriate for Project Achievement Day. Bring a suit or sport coat and tie for the awards banquet on Tuesday evening and for the Vol State Ceremony on Thursday evening. Long pants, collared shirts and dress shoes are appropriate for assemblies.

Note: Ripped jeans, shorts, tube tops, t-shirts with offensive slogans or messages in bad taste and muscle shirts are inappropriate. Hats of any kind are not permitted to be worn inside buildings. Not following the dress code results in loss of participation.
